

Arrowmen: Where Are They Now? Dan O'Neill by Na Tsi Hi at Forestburg, when he was elected to his second term as Virginia. where he is a Surface Wa

Currently a United States Naval Officer at the AEGIS Training and Readiness Center in Dahlgren, Virginia, Arrowman and Eagle Scout Daniel O'Neill, of Troop 18, Freehold, has a rich history of involvement in our Lodge.

The 26-year-old began his adventures with the OA in 2000 and soon moved up to many leadership positions, such as Ceremonies Chairman, Lodge Chief and Section Chief.

O'Neill attributes some of his best OA experiences to the Conclaves, which he attended from 2001-2006. His favorite Conclave was in 2005, hosted by Na Tsi Hi at Forestburg, when he was elected to his second term as Section Chief. He also attended NOAC where he served on staff of the High Adventure area.

One of O'Neill's funniest OA experiences was when he set a headdress on fire while playing the part of Allowat Sakima during the Ordeal Ceremony at Forestburg, which earned him his Vigil name, Large Sailor Who Burns Headdresses.

During his time in the OA, O'Neill said, "there are countless Arrowmen both youth and adult who have guided me along my path. The youth are infinite, without my fellow Arrowmen I would not have any of the experiences I had." He specifically noted some of his Advisers to be especially helpful guiding him along his path: Jim Brown (Past Cubmaster/Scoutmaster), Walter Downing (Past Ceremonies Adviser), the late Dave Wolverton (Past Lodge Adviser), and Jeff Goldsmith (Past NE-2A Adviser).

Before his current position as Naval Officer, O'Neill's past jobs were Communications Officer on *USS John S. McCain* and Missile Fire Control Officer on *USS Shiloh*. Both ships were stationed in Yokosuka, Japan, where

he lived for 4 years. He now lives in Virginia, where he is a Surface Warfare Officer by trade, currently the Ballistic Missile Defense Course Supervisor at the AEGIS Training and Readiness Center.

Even with a busy work schedule, O'Neill still maintains his involvement in Scouting as the Cubmaster of Pack 172, Dahlgren, VA and a Skipper on Sea Scout Ship 191, King George, VA. Outside of work and Scouting, he enjoys sailing, kayaking, backpacking and SCUBA Diving.

In the future, he plans on attending George Washington University to earn his Masters of Business Administration as well as his Masters of Science in Finance. He also plans on returning to Japan as a Department Head on a Ship. He returned to New Jersey to attend Na Tsi Hi's Fall Powwow and plans to join us at Forestburg in the Spring.

For current Arrowmen, O'Neill advises, "to take full advantage of everything the OA has to offer you... Go to NOAC and the Conclaves, you will never forget those experiences. Strive to become a Lodge, Section or even Region/National Officer. Those positions will prepare you for life beyond Scouting."

The activities were plentiful, including ultimate Frisbee, dodgeball, rock climbing, ice pick monkey bars, and the mascot challenge. Every night, after all the afternoon

Gandhi made peaceful protest and peaceful civil disobedience a valuable process of peaceful change. Susan B. Anthony rose to the challenge as a famous leader of the battle to obtain women's right to vote in the U.S. In 1908, an acclaimed English war hero, Robert Baden Powell, founded the Scouting movement in Great Britain.

Seven years later at Treasure Island in the Delaware River, E. Urner Goodman launched an innovative program, the Order of the Arrow, which is based on peer recognition and service to others. John F. Kennedy, America's thirty-fifth President believed that "one person can make a difference and every person should try."

We need to realize that important improvements can begin with one person. It that one person is truly passionate about his or her mission, then he can make a difference. Imagine what would happen if each one of us worked together to improve the attendance at each of our Lodge events. It is easy to say that you don't need to attend the next event, and that it would not matter since you were only one person. What happens when two hundred Arrowmen feel this way?
