1950 was quite a busy year. Harry Truman was President of the United States. The Peanuts cartoon (with Charlie Brown and everyone's favorite Beagle Scout Snoopy) was first published. The Korean War began. The very first color tv was invented. And more locally, in our neck of the woods (or Pines one might say) a small group of youth and adults gathered in December 1950 in the Pine Hollow cabin at Camp Housman on the old Allaire property just one mile from where the original Ohowa Lodge 71 had been founded. The Scouts had already been inducted into the Order at other council's camps. They formed a new Lodge called Na-Tasi-Hi, which meant "in the pines"—a reference to Camp Housman's location on the northern fringe of the Pine Barrens. The Lodge's totem would be "three pine trees" to represent the three parts of the Scout Oath and the three principles of the Order.



OA Member Portal

The Order of the Arrow has recently introduced a Member Portal, though which you can do the following:

- Update your contact information (email/phone/mailing address)
- View the Lodge calendar
- Find links to register for events
- Check if your dues are paid
- Contact Lodge leadership with questions

You will be sent an invitation following this weekend's induction information to help you prepare for your journey to Brotherhood.

You must be 13 years of age or older to get a Member Portal account. Currently there is no access for parents to accounts of members who are under 13, either. A future update should add the ability for parents of members under 13 to access on their behalf.

Get an Arrow ID account

The Order of the Arrow has a single-sign-on system called Arrow ID which is used to access any official Order of the Arrow. You will need an Arrow ID account first before you can access the Member Portal. If you don't have an account yet, you can sign up with the following steps:

1. Go to https://id.oa-bsa.org/Account/Register

2. Fill in your name, your email address, and the password you want to use for your account, and submit the form.

- 3. Click Register.
- 4. Follow any directions given to complete your registration.

Get a Member Portal Invitation

Click the link in the invitation email. If you get prompted to log in, then do so using your Arrow ID login. After you've logged in, go back to the email and click the link again. If it doesn't automatically link your account, click the red "Have an invite?" button near the top, choose "Member Portal" for the application. Select your council. Then paste in the code from the email and click "Add".
